

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois, along with the World Health Organization and the United States Breastfeeding Committee, acknowledge the benefits of breastfeeding for infants and their parents; and,

WHEREAS, promoting and supporting all human milk-feeding families regardless of race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, education level, socioeconomic status, or any other factor that makes every family and community unique; and,

WHEREAS, Healthy People 2030 recognizes that breastfeeding is associated with reduced health risks and aims to increase the proportion of infants breastfed at six months and one year; and,

WHEREAS, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends exclusive human milk feeding as the most developmentally appropriate nourishment for infants for the first six months of life, with continued human milk feeding until two years or beyond to optimize infant health, growth, and development; and,

WHEREAS, breastfeeding plays an important role in managing the double burden of malnutrition by providing food security, reducing inequalities, and providing immunologic protection for Illinois' youngest people; and,

WHEREAS, protecting the right to breastfeed and providing support in employment settings that make breastfeeding comfortable, acceptable, and accessible in the workplace setting while recognizing that pregnant people and new parents who want to breastfeed should have the right - that right should be without barriers in their communities, employment setting, and without discrimination;

THEREFORE, I, JB Pritzker, Governor of the State of Illinois, do hereby proclaim August 2024 as Breastfeeding Month in Illinois.
